CONFLICT RESOLUTION

Whether you are an adult or child, conflict is a part of our daily lives. We can experience both inner and outer conflict as we maneuver through our days.

Often, children need guidance and support in learning skills to help them handle conflict. Young children may not have the ability to self-regulate, which is an important skill in learning to negotiate and work through adversity. Opportunities to work through conflict will also provide opportunities to learn self-regulation. Many emotions can be involved in compromising and negotiating with others.

As adults, we need to recognize that learning to handle conflict is an important skill for children. When helping children work through adversity, there are three personal traits early childhood providers may find helpful.

- 1. accept that conflict is ok
- 2. be objective and avoid blame
- 3. know the process of working through a problem may be more important than the outcome

Children can learn so much in negotiating conflicts. They learn to compromise, recognize different viewpoints and opinions, find alternate solutions, accept consequences, and understand they won't always be right.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION STEPS

- 1.Initiate mediation (recognize the problem)
- 2. Gather data (speak to involved children)
- 3. Define the problem (adult summarizes, children acknowledge)
- 4. Generate alternate solutions (children initiate, adult assists)
- 5. Agree on a solution (all involved children)
- 6. Follow through (adult may assist)
